Season's Greetings From Marktown

The Holiday Season is once again upon us and it is time to begin thinking about many things. Christmas past, Christmas present and Christmas future all come to mind as the holiday season shifts from Halloween to Thanksgiving and now to Christmas and the New Year.

The illustration below lends itself well to all three periods of time: the past, present and future. How many young people have delighted in seeing electric trains beneath the Christmas Tree each year. While trains may not be in vogue these days, the concept of sharing and giving remains with us always.

While toy trains may have been replaced with new electronic gadgets like portable CD players and something called an iPod, what is more important than the material gift is the concept of giving of one's self.

Far too often people get caught up in the gift wrapping and gift giving syndrome and forget the true meaning of the season. It is a time of sharing and understanding. It is a time of new beginnings and moving forward.

Since its inception in 1917 as the Mark Town Site, this neighborhood has always had the reputation of always working together for the common cause, putting politics aside for the betterment of the community.

In the early years when the bread winner of the family was laid off, their neighbors here in Marktown would see to it that the family stayed warm and were at least afforded one warm meal a day.

During World War II the ladies of Marktown formed a group that rolled bandages and provided

relief packages for the troops stationed abroad, much like what has happened this past year with the children of this community supporting the military troops in Iraq.

Following the war and just after the properties were sold by the company the residents worked together once again to prevent Youngstown Sheet and Tube from having our neighborhood zoned industrial so they could buy up the properties and eventually tear them down.

We worked together as a community in 1974 and placed Marktown on the National Register of Historic Places and prevented the federal government from razing Marktown for the expansion of Cline Avenue.

We worked together in the 1970s, 1980s and 1990s on resolving garbage can issues, sewer gas issues and other critical matters that would have a negative affect on this neighborhood.

We worked together in the redesign of the Marktown Parks and on the street project that was begun in 1990.

We even worked together as a community to appeal the CLT reassessment of our homes, thus saving this neighborhood from what would have been outrageous taxes.

Over the past decade we have lost that focus

and that ability to resolve problems within this community. It is time to take the Christmas Season seriously and to once again put our differences aside for the betterment of all of the residents of Marktown. Let's work together this holiday season and for years to come in order to make the Marktown Historic District a truly wonderful place to live and to raise our families.

THE CONTAINED DISPOSAL FACILITY AND MARKTOWN

For a number of years the residents of East Chicago and especially the Marktown Historic District have expressed their concern for the environmental and health impact that the Contained Disposal Facility (CDF) will have on our community. There are two absolutes that must be taken into consideration: 1) The Indiana Harbor Ship Canal absolutely must be dredged, first to a navigational depth and then to a standard for environmental consideration, and 2) the dredged material will be stored at the CDF which is directly up wind from Marktown.

With these two facts in mind the question was raised as to what can be done to insure the safety and well being of our residents. The person who came up with the answer was Betty Balanoff, Ph.D. who serves as the Chairman of the Coalition For a Clean Environment CCE.

Mrs. Balanoff has fought for the environmental rights of all of the citizens in the Calumet Region and she knew where to go to for the answers. She teamed up with Bessie Dent of the Calumet Project.

A national group called the Technical Outreach Services To Communities (TOSC) provided a grant to Michigan State University (MSU) to facilitate a two part respiratory ailment survey of neighborhoods in East Chicago that may experience negative health impact from the dredging of the canal and the utilization of the CDF. TOSC is comprised of different members from across the U.S. but is based in East Lansing, Michigan at Michigan State University.

Elizabeth Wilkinson was brought in to facilitate the actual survey phase of the program. She holds a BA in

Sociology from Adrian College in Michigan and is currently on her 2nd and final year at the University of Michigan pursuing a Master's of Social Work.

Rose Estrada of Indiana University Northwest was in charge of recruiting the volunteers for the project, all of whom were students from IU Northwest. To announce the program a letter (in English and Spanish) from the CCE was delivered to Marktown residents with the September issue of Marktown Update. To facilitate the survey team while in Marktown the home of Paul Myers was made available to them for a staging area for the survey. For the record, this was a blind survey in that names and addresses of the participants were not requested or recorded.

The individual survey forms will be reviewed at the University of Illinois - Chicago (UI-C) and their findings will be published in a professional journal late next year. Once that report is available it will be provided to the residents of Marktown and to various city officials as needed.

The second phase of the survey will take place approximately two years after they begin the actual dredging of the Indiana Harbor Ship Canal.

for the children when they come off of the school bus. As kids will be kids, they look after them to make sure that fights do not happen after school or on their way home and that the children are kept safe.

They provide guidance, inspiration, fun and educational activities and they make the after school times interesting and challenging for the children. They come up with some outstanding ideas that have been adopted by the Recreation Department for use across the entire city. One good example of that is the Back to School Festival which is now a city wide event.



Together, with the volunteers like Juanita McCormick, Kim Rodriguez, and Nancy (Deiotte) Fink they develop ideas that they are able to put into action, usually with supplies that are donated by residents of this community. Well done ladies. You are an inspiration for us all!

Mark Manufacturing Included In Exhibit

For the past twenty years the Marktown Preservation Society, Inc. has sponsored a number of exhibits featuring the Marktown Historic District and its parent company Mark Manufacturing Company. This past year we donated a digital file of more than sixty 1920 photographs of our neighborhood and the production facilities of the adjacent plant to the Calumet Archive of Indiana University Northwest.

The original photographs were taken by the Chicago Architectural Photography Company for Mr. Clayton Mark in preparation for his sale of Indiana Harbor Works to Youngstown Sheet and Tube Company in 1923.

This past spring a portion of the collection was used in an industrial photo exhibit at IU Northwest.

We were not

surprised this past month when we learned that a portion of the photos were on display at the Indiana Welcome Center in Hammond on Kennedy Avenue just off of I80/94.

The exhibit is in relation to innovators in a number of disciplines & fields and is titled "Innovations: Celebrating Innovations In Ingenuity in Northwest Indiana." Included in the exhibit are a number of topics including manufacturing, air flight, oil refining and yes - Steel.



Clayton Mark and Mark Manufacturing along with all of the major steel companies in the Calumet Region were known to be innovators in their own right.

Marktown will be included in at least one exhibit at the Indiana Welcome Center in 2006. See you at the Welcome Center!

Marktown Update Celebrates 3rd Anniversary.....

Another year passes by and Marktown moves closer to being a neighborhood again as opposed to disagreeing factions with nothing but political control at the forefront. While this is the third year of Marktown Update, 2005 marks the fifteenth anniversary of the Marktown Preservation Society, Inc. - Marktown's only nonprofit organization recognized by the Indiana Secretary of State.

In the past three years we have published our monthly newsletter and have provided our residents and friends with more than 300 pages containing more than 350 articles in all. This past year we not only provided the usual 12 issues of Marktown Update, but we were privileged to issue our first special edition on the World Changers program. And let's not forget the various flyers that we have either developed ourselves or distributed to our residents on behalf of other organizations.

Far beyond the publishing of the newsletter, the Marktown Preservation Society, Inc. has served this neighborhood in many capacities, each time looking out for all of our residents. Our projects this past year have included but are by no means limited to the following:

- The successful appeal of 30 Marktown properties that were somehow omitted by CLT in the informal appeals process.
- The agreement with the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) that air monitoring will take place in Marktown during the dredging of the Indiana Harbor Ship Canal (IHSC).
- The agreement with the EPA that when the risk analysis for the dredging of the Grand Calumet River and nonnavigable portions of the IHSC that the residents of Marktown will be involved in the survey and that our involvement will include full Spanish translation so that everyone is included and no one

is excluded.

- We represented the residents of Marktown during the Marquette Plan meetings and encouraged that the lands to the north of us be converted to park lands as opposed to industrial sites.
- We have provided homeowners with individual (free) consultations on the restoration and renovation of their property.
- We helped to facilitate the donation of four computers to the Marktown Community Center and have helped to make arrangements for free Comcast internet access to those computers.



- We donated more than \$500.00 of bulletin boards to the Marktown Community Center so that public notices and other items of interest to this community can be posted without having to staple into the paneling on the walls.
- We have worked with local youths to keep the parks clean for everyone.
- We have managed to obtain a representative position on the Waterway Management District's Environmental Committee
- We have included Marktown in the Cultural Connections Exhibit at the Indiana Welcome Center and are preparing a new display for an exhibit this upcoming year.
- We brought Dr. Betty Balanoff of the Coalition For A Safe Environment to Marktown for a well attended community meeting.
- We participated in a Legacy Foundation seminar on the gover-

nance of nonprofit organizations.

- We worked with city officials to guarantee that when the power went out last January, that the back up pumps were in place to keep our basements dry.
- We have provided invaluable tax relief information to property owners in Marktown in reference to tax credits and exemptions.
- We worked with NIPSCO Forestry Department to see that the trees in our park were not cut down or overly trimmed as they had attempted to do in the past.
- We supported the letter writing to the brave young and women who stand in harms way in Iraq.
- We assisted in the celebration of Memorial Day & Veteran's Day and helped instill in the children of this community the importance of those who serve in the U.S. Military.
- We helped to facilitate the Passion Play on Easter weekend and rejoiced with those present at that truly remarkable event.
- We have continued to negotiate with US Steel in obtaining the use or ownership of the parking lot adjacent to the softball field.
- We have worked with the E.C. Engineering Department on the renovation of the Marktown Community Center.
- We worked with Mayor Pabey, and 5th District Councilman Robert Garcia to see to it that the Marktown Community Center conforms to American Disability Standards so it can be used as our polling place for the 2006 elections.
- We have worked with the E.C. Engineering Department, the Office of the Mayor, Common Council members and the City Controller to see that the street project which was begun under our direction in 1990 is completed according to those plans this next year.
- We have donated books, video tapes and other items as needed to the Marktown Community Center for use by everyone from this community.

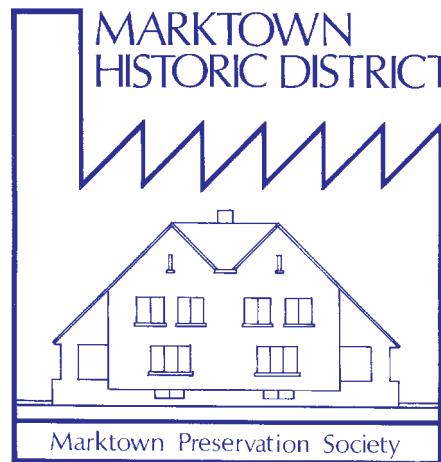

- We have helped to promote cultural diversity in Marktown and throughout this city and aided those supporting those less fortunate among us.
- We led the way this fall in volunteering to produce the Energy Assistance Program flyers and made sure that they were not only distributed to all of Marktown, but that posters were made available to all of the community centers across East Chicago.
- We worked with Mayor Pabey and the Parks and Recreation department to see to it that Marktown was included in the Arbor Day Celebrations and that three additional trees were planted in the Marktown Park.
- We obtained permission from the Water Department and the Fire Department to water the 17 new and relatively newly planted trees in our park and prevent their loss due to the drought of 2005.
- We signed Marktown up to have additional trees planted on the public parkways in 2006 making us an active part of Tree City USA.
- We continued our street by street public access weed whacking program and helped to clean up virtually all of the Marktown streets and sidewalks this past year.
- We completed two grants at a total value exceeding \$8,500.00 and in doing so installed a new planter and sign at 129th Street and Dickey Road.
- We renewed the 1920s planter on the corner of Indianapolis Blvd. and Riley Road and have planted both perennials and spring bulbs for the benefit of all who pass by that intersection.
- We brought World Changers to Marktown and assisted in bringing them to the Carnegie Library District in Indiana Harbor and in doing so established a very nonpolitical way to serve our residents.
- We have assisted and supported the children of Marktown in various sports and recreational activities in-

cluding baseball, softball, sailing and football.

- With the use of Paul's Model A Ford we have been represented in all three local parades and at 4th of July Parades in Whiting and Highland.
- We have researched and provided information for stucco repair to all of our residents and readers.
- We have been asked to provide the house number shields to two more blocks of Marktown, free of charge. The numbers and shields will be painted in the spring of 2006.



- We have brought Purdue University Calumet to Marktown for educational purposes and in doing so, have increased the future potential of our entire neighborhood.
- We have brought the graduate school of the Art Institute of Chicago to Marktown for educational and research purposes.
- We are currently working with the staff at the Illinois Institute of Technology to bring their adaptive reuse architectural class to Marktown this next semester.
- We have brought more than 1,000 non residents to this neighborhood this past year, all of whom consider Marktown an absolute marvel of design and engineering and worthy of our attention to the original design.
- We have worked with the Pullman Historic District in celebrating historic preservation in the two neighborhoods.

- We have worked with city officials and Marktown residents in ridding our community of the raccoons and stray cats that have once again infested this neighborhood.
- We have begun the process of making sure that the next property reassessment will not run our friends and neighbors out of this neighborhood.
- We helped to facilitate the first phase of the respiratory survey that took place in October of this year, and in doing so have helped to guarantee the safety and health of all of the residents of Marktown.

In general, what we do is promote the future of the Marktown Historic District. We realize that had it not been for people like Chester Williams who fought to prevent Marktown from being zoned industrial in the 1950s that we would not be here to talk about this at all.

We realize that had Marktown not been placed on the National Register of Historic Places in 1975, that we would not be here to do anything, for Marktown would have been razed to make way for Cline Avenue and industrial expansion.

We realize that all of the major plans and projects that have been successful in this community were supported by virtually all of the neighborhood. We realize that the funding of the restoration of our parks in the 1980s was due to the fact that we are on the National Register of Historic Places. We also realize that the street renovation program that began in 1990 was funded because we are on the National Register of Historic Places.

The Marktown Preservation Society, Inc. is here to serve all of this neighborhood and to see that our future is as glorious as our past. It is time for everyone to put their petty differences aside and truly work for the betterment of this community and a future that can only be guaranteed through the celebration of our historic past.

Historic preservation saved this community from the wrecker's ball in 1975 and should be the foundation of our future for generations to come.

Substance Abuse Seminar Provided For Area Youth

around them.

Ms. Gonzalez knows how it works. You see, she is a recovering addict who abused drugs and neglected the important things in her life. But after spending just one week in jail she realized that her actions not only affected her, but the future lives of her children.

Ms. Gonzalez is not only drug and alcohol free but is in her third year at Calumet College of St. Joseph where she is majoring in addiction counseling. If anyone can get the point across to the children that drugs and alcohol are bad for you, then it is someone that has been there and done just that.

The event was very well received and Ms. Judy, Ms. Maria and the children of Marktown were very good hosts to our visitors from New Addition. So remember - just **Promise To Be Drug Free and KEEP THAT PROMISE every day of your life.**

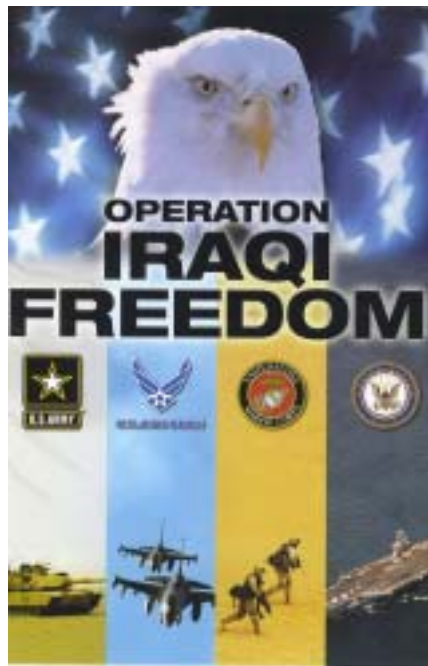
